I help to manage a team of 25-30 physiotherapists and admin staff, my role is split 60:40 (clinical to non-clinical). I help to organise the team with annual leave, rotas, sickness, clinical rotas and cover. I cover a musculoskeletal caseload of patients and supervise less senior staff from a clinical perspective. I have a key role





in the day to day running of the department and pool. I am lucky to work with patients in the hydrotherapy pool for two sessions per week.

I love interacting with people from patients and their families/carers to internal and external NHS colleagues. Working with such a large team gives a variety of experience on a daily basis and fantastic learning opportunities. I feel lucky to work in the hydrotherapy pool twice a week as I get such rewarding results with patients.

As a teenager I had physiotherapy for shin pain at the old Ystrad Mynach hospital. I was instantly attracted to the profession and the caring nature of the role. I did my research and I was then fortunate to start some work experience on a weekly basis in the physiotherapy department for a year. Here, I gained experiences in both outpatients and on the wards.

Despite the competitiveness of joining the physiotherapy profession, I worked hard and got the results I needed to join the BSc Hons course in Birmingham, in 2002. I graduated in 2005 and I secured a job with Gwent Trust as a then, junior physiotherapist. Since then, I have completed my B5, and B6 rotations in physiotherapy, before working at County Hospital for 15 years in the Musculoskeletal Outpatient Department as a senior physiotherapist.
